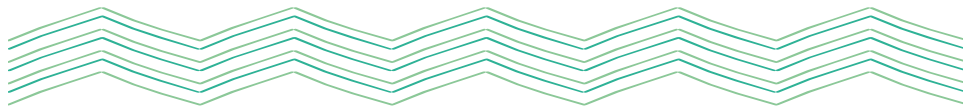
Popoki Peace Workshop in Sanda!

On 11 February, Popoki made his first appearance in Sanda. The occasion was an Intercultural Day sponsored by the Sanda City International Association. A lot of people gathered and participated in such events as a Japanese speech contest, world cooking, fair trade café, and others. Popoki was very busy holding a workshop for parents and children. The atmosphere was lively, with about twenty people of all different ages. The children began with making a cat from blocks and soon

everyone was making suggestions about how to proceed. It was really interesting how nobody said, “Don’t do it that way!” but instead expressed their recognition of, and appreciation for the efforts of others with comments like “That’s an interesting way to do it...” or “Look at that tail!” Later, when we divided into small groups to make drawings, the room was filled with images and words...What color is peace? What does it smell like? Is it warm? Cool? It was a day when the city of Sanda became just a little bit more gentle.

**“Making Peace” The 10th Central Japan District YMCA Global Education Seminar

The 10th Central Japan District YMCA Global Seminar was held at the Mt. Rokko YMCA on 26-27 February. There were 38 participants, including International and outdoor recreation volunteers from the Kobe, Wakayama, Kyoto, Okayama, Osaka, Nara and Shiga YMCAs, participants in the Kobe YMCA Thai work camp, and YMCA staff and invited lecturers.

The theme of this year’s seminar was “Making Peace,” and we understood it to refer to everything from ourselves to global events. I was able to find hope, as I shared thoughts, ideas and feelings about peace with seminar participants.



The lecture on the first day was on the theme of “Thinking about Peace with our Entire Body” (Lecture: Ronni Alexander). We thought about our own peace, through group work and other activities. What is peace and what is non-peace? We all faced questions of how we should be involved. Using *Popoki’s Peace Book*, we were able to feel close to Popoki and to think about peace in the context of our own lives. We discussed episodes from our own lives and in the process, we grew closer as a group and were able to talk freely and openly. Using words from Popoki’s basket, we discussed what is important to us, and shared stories of painful and other experiences. These discussions allowed us to imagine and discuss ways we would like to change and grow.



The theme for the second day was “Where is there peace? Living together” (Lecture: Shuichi Nakao). Using maps of the world, film and other media, we discussed what we saw and how we felt. Using examples such as Vietnamese refugees and boat people and issues such as prejudice and discrimination, we were able to discuss peace in a more concrete way.

Through participating in this seminar, I was able to meet many people and learn many things. We ended with renewed commitment to not only spreading knowledge, but particularly to helping others to want to learn about others and to be interested in what is happening around them.

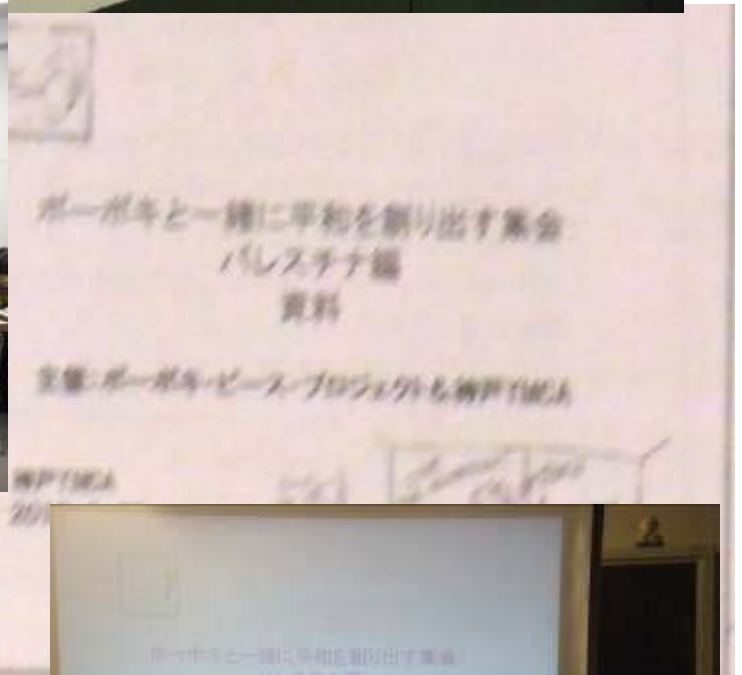
Popoki's Peace Making Meeting: Thinking about Palestine

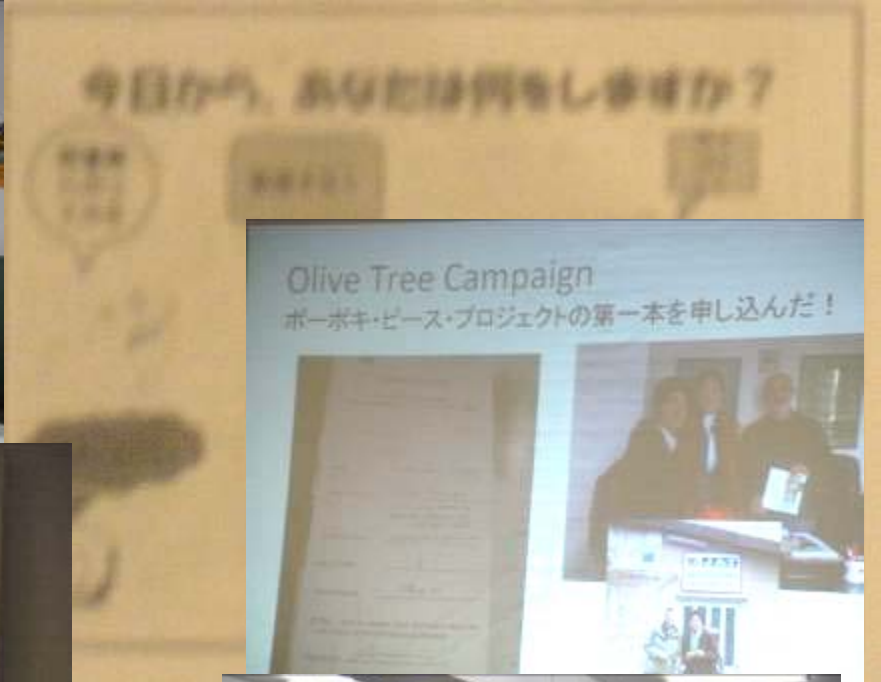
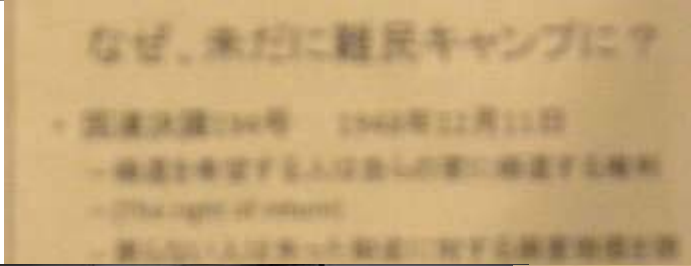
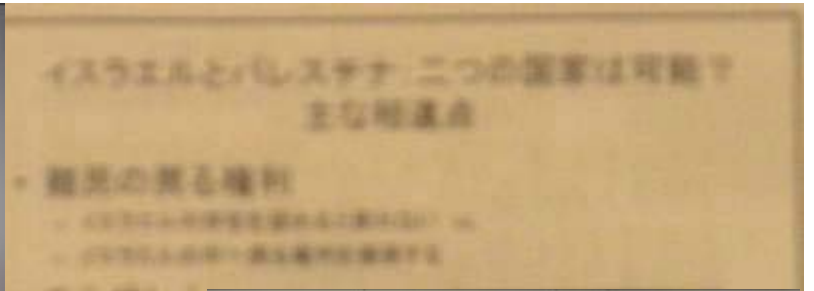

A comment from one of the participants...

I was looking forward to the report about the second trip of Popoki members to Palestine. Because I joined the first trip, I was happy to hear the names of the people that I met there.

It was reported that in front of the Wall, even an ambulance is requested to stop and the patients need to be transferred to the Israeli ambulance. Some patients die while they wait for it.....

When I went to Palestine, I was shocked by the Wall. But after I listened to the report this time, I felt that it is bigger and more difficult problem than I thought, and that the question, which is "What on earth can be done after the Wall is made?"

And also, as the last trip, I was thinking that "There are many olive trees planted in this area." I learned from the report that olive trees are also a way to insist on Palestinian rights to the land. It was surprising to me. It is their way to object to the settlers. One of the movements is the "Olive Tree Campaign," which is a campaign where people donate \$20 to on plant an olive tree on Palestine land. I thought I can try to join that campaign. (Urai Kana)

What Popoki Means to Me

This is my second contribution to “What Popoki means to me”. This time, I would like to talk about Brazil, the field of my research. Brazil is one of the countries with great economic growth called BRICs (Brazil, Russia, India and China), but the truth is, it is also one of the countries with big earning differentials¹.

The other day, 5th of April, there was a local heavy downpour which the State of Rio de Janeiro, Brazil has not had for several decades. More than two hundred people have died and several thousands of people are still taking refuge at shelters. Rio de Janeiro is a city which is surrounded by mountains and seas, somewhat similar to Kobe, where Popoki was born. The difference is that the slum areas are concentrated on the sides of the mountains and wealthy people reside near the ocean where it has been developed for resorts. This time, most of the victims were those who lived in slums on the sides of the mountains. The wealthy people live in buildings of steel reinforced concrete and slum people live in fragile barracks. There is also a large gap of damage caused by natural disaster between them.

Presently, the reconstruction of the town is in progress, and I truly wish the plan of reconstruction will take into consideration the poor who would be living on the streets. I express my sympathy to the more than two hundred victims and their families and I wish the thousands of people who are at the shelters will be able to return to a better life soon.

Next month, I will be going to Brazil for the first time in more than 10 years. I also want the Brazilians to know about Popoki and it may be a small step toward correcting the gap.
