Everyone found different aspects that struck their interest.


Looking at the picture with friends, we found things we had not seen by ourselves and gained different points of view.

Messages from Tohoku (1)

Interviewee: Dr. Mamoru Michimata (M)

Interviewer: Akira Nishiyama (N)

Dr Mamoru Michimata is a pediatrician and grew up in Otsuchi-town. He is a fan of the Hanshin Tigers baseball team. The building of his clinic has pink walls and a lot of cute toys inside. The atmosphere makes people relax.



N. "Where were you and what were you doing when the disaster happened?"

M. "At the time of the disaster, I was on a bed on the second floor of my house. The water filled the room until my bed was just 10cm from the ceiling, but I didn't think that I would die."

N. "What have you done since the disaster?"

M. "I devoted myself to helping people. Most of the doctors in

Otsuchi-town stayed here. We have a strong will to reconstruct our town by ourselves."

N. "Why did you paint the walls of your building pink?"

M. "Because pink makes people feel bright and happy. I hoped that people who were hurt by the disaster and lost hope would feel better by seeing my pink clinic."

N. "Do you have any message or strong feeling from the disaster to share?"

M. "I lost many things due to the disaster, but gained lots of things at the same time. The impressive thing for me among them is the connection between people. Watching people helping each other, I really understood that connection is really important. In addition, I was surprised to see the quality of the disaster relief measures and also the speed. For instance, furniture in temporary housing is designed according to the composition of the family living there. I thought the Japanese sense in this regard is great."



Messages from Tohoku (2)

Hello again everyone!!!

This is Yusuke-nyan, I am Popoki's friend, and I interviewed one of the Popoki's friends who lives in Otsuchi-cho~~~!!

Please welcome, Dr. Toshiro Ueta!!!

Dr. Ueta was born and grew up in Otsuchi town. He owned a hospital, a high building that

was also his house and that was located in the center of Otsuchi town. When Dr. Ueta was young, he didn't want to become a doctor. But more than that he didn't want to be a 'salary man.' Also his father was a doctor, so he chose the same profession. His house and clinic were in the same building and the building and everything around it were washed away by the tsunami. In spite of this, Dr. Ueta still has big hopes for his life and for Otsuchi. For example, since the disaster, he has already built a new clinic, but he still wants to expand it.



He has wonderfully strong life energy and he is such a nice person!

Well, let us peek in on the interview~~~!!!

(Interviewee: Dr. Ueta Interviewer: Yusuke-nyan)

Yusuke (below: Y) "When the Tsunami came, where were you?"

Dr. Ueta (below: U) "When the earthquake first came, I was in my hospital. Because it was a huge earthquake, I knew a tsunami would come. So I decided to go up to the roof of the hospital with the nurses."

Y "When the tsunami came, what did it look like?"

U "The tsunami came up to the 3rd floor of the hospital. In a moment, it looked like we were in the center of the sea. That made me think it was dangerous, so and I put a mountain climbing rope around the roof so we could hold on if the tsunami came that high."

Y "What color was the tsunami?"

U "When the tsunami came, I felt it was gray. And it looked like a huge black wall surging at us. Although it might sound strange, I felt the next morning was a beautiful 'Japanese blue.'"

Y "When the tsunami come, what did you feel?"

U "When the tsunami came, I couldn't feel any sounds or vibrations, and that moment I was sure, I will survive! I will never give up! Whatever happens, I will survive!"

Y "What do you think about the disaster now?"

U "It is important to be prepared in case such a disaster happens again. We should think about management of information, geographical problems and mitigation; for example, we should think about how to predict the height of the tsunami or how to raise the height of the town to be better prepared."

Y "This is my last question. Do you have any messages for us?"

U "First, I want to say thank you very much for your support. I reconfirmed the importance of medical care in the region, and I realized how much I love my home town. Thanks to everyone I can eat. I am happy that we can live and are helping each other."

Dr. Ueta did not say the following words directly, but I think they are in our hearts, so I have written them here.

"We want to forget, but we will remember."

It has been just 2 years since the Great East Japan Earthquake happened.... The time for me seems to be very short, but I wonder how those who experienced it think and feel about it.

We, Popoki and Popoki's friends, were visiting Otsuchi-cho in Iwate prefecture from February 8 to 12. These 5 days were too short for our activities, but I think we spent enriched and delightful time. We will introduce our trip in three sections, starting this month, and following in the April and May editions of 'Popoki News'.

OK! Here we go! In this section we will report about the general flow and schedule of the trip!! This time, we went

to Tohoku as a large group of cats. For some of us, including me, it was "Tohoku, hello again!" but for some of us it was "Tohoku, it is nice to finally meet you!"



The gold line on this pole shows the approximate height to which land must be raised for construction. It is about 1.9 meters.

So, the first day after we arrived in Otsuchi on the morning of February 9, we went to the house of Motomochi Sachiko-san who works with a local NPO "Tsudoi" (which means 'a meeting' in English): supporting people and Otsuchi town." We enjoyed a very delicious breakfast which Hiroko-san, the mother of Sachiko-san, made for us. Especially wakame, one kind of seasonal Japanese seaweed, was so good! During the breakfast, Sachiko-san talked about the present situation of Otsuchi. She told us that many new buildings and roads were being constructed

because local government grant subsidies for recovery of industry stop at the end of March. We could understand the situation when we drove through the town later.

Then we went to MAST, large shopping mall in Otsuchi, to prepare for our main activity- exhibition of Popoki Friendship Story cloths. We exhibited 10 cloths on large panels there, and set some chairs and tables around. We spread new cloths for visitors, so they could draw. We also added impression cards and notes for visitors if they wanted to leave a message. We are going to introduce some of the impression cards in the next 'Popoki News'. Our main activity was this exhibition on February 9th and 10th. Many people came and looked at what people had drawn. Some of them saw their own drawings from previous activities. Popoki was very glad to see so many people!!



During our exhibition, Popoki's friends Sasaki-san, who is a practitioner of acupuncture, Ito-san and Tobai-san, who we introduced in previous editions of 'Popoki News', came to see us. Also Ueta sensei visited us and he was so kind as to guide some of us around Otsuchi. On February 10, we had a chance to take a tea break at Chiffon, which Popoki's friend Kobayashi-san is managing. We are so happy to have more and more friends in Otsuchi town.

On February 11, we visited the

Traditional Arts Festival in Otsuchi. This festival was held to celebrate the twentieth anniversary of the founding of a local group to save and protect traditional art. At this event, many Otsuchi local people showed us their traditional dances. A lot of people had stopped dancing after the disaster, but both children and adults were dancing on this special day.

We also met a woman, Yasu-san, who is Tobai-san's friend. Yasu-san was so cheerful and is such a wonderful woman. She told us about her experience after the disaster, and invited us to her home. Popoki could get a special vital energy from her.

On this trip, although the time was very short, we had a wonderful time! This maybe is the result of Popoki's continuing trips to Otsuchi over these two years. We would like to continue to deepen the bond with the many Popoki's friends we made and also welcome new friends.
